Unaudited Financials for Fiscal Year 2015*

NVDA'S revenues came from numerous sources including a share of the state's property tax funds; private, state, and federal grants; and annual appropriations from each of our 50 member communities. We also received rental income from the Charles E. Carter Business Resource Center, and other income from contracted technical assistance services such as grant administration and municipal plan and bylaw development.

NVDA also has two Intermediary Relending Programs from USDA Rural Development and a Nonprofit Community Development Organization relending program capitalized by loan repayments from Community Development Block Grants. There was no new lending activity to report in FY2015, due in part to low interest rates from commercial lenders and an availability of alternative lending options.

From the Executive Director

THE NORTHEASTERN VERMONT DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION (NVDA) has completed its 65th year of service to Vermont's Northeast Kingdom! It is unlikely, however, that we will retire anytime soon. Given the breadth of services we offer and the ever-changing requirements faced by municipalities and businesses, NVDA remains the first organization to call for assistance. We relish that role and will always do our best to meet local needs.

There has been much publicity surrounding the EB-5 investments made, and we are pleased to see positive changes occurring in our region. Orleans County experienced significant growth in employment activity from Dec. 2009 (the depths of the recession) to May 2014. The growth rate nearly doubled the second highest rates in Chittenden and Lamoille Counties. Groundbreaking for the AnC-BIO Vermont facility in Newport occurred in May. We are now working with developers to bring related businesses to establish a biomedical campus. NVDA's transportation and land use planning expertise proved invaluable for permit review of projects like Walmart, AnC-BIO, Newport State Airport, and the Renaissance Block. We continue to see robust growth in the agriculture/value-added sector, even beyond the Hardwick area. NVDA continues to work with advance manufacturers to help them thrive. There has also been much in-depth planning in emergency readiness and flood preparedness.

NVDA's Wind Study Report was released this year. A volunteer study committee completed extensive research and had tough discussions about industrial-scale renewable energy. Their work led to a major recommendation for NVDA to use for participation in future projects.

There were changes within the NVDA staff. Joe Kasprzak left NVDA in July and Karen Geraghty, formerly with UVM Extension, recently joined us. We thank Joe for his great work, and we're certain that Karen will continue to build upon his efforts. Frank Maloney was hired in January to replace Gail Aloisio. Frank's expertise with GIS has made a valuable contribution from day one.

I am very proud of the work of all of NVDA's staff. Their efforts keep the organization strong and ready to serve the businesses and communities of the Northeast Kingdom.

We link municipalities with the training and resources they need to navigate the many complexities of local governance.

As an economic development corporation, NVDA maintains industrial parks and facilities for new and expanding businesses. Direct visits with area employers and entrepreneurs keep us abreast of their important issues – and provide businesses the tools they need to remain competitive.



FY2015 HIGHLIGHTS:

Transportation planning:

Our collaboration with the region's conservation districts is unparalleled in the state, resulting in inventories of flood-prone infrastructure and training programs. We're building a strong foundation for local capital budgeting and planning.

- Emergency response and preparedness: Helping our towns prepare for the next disaster remains a priority. NVDA assists municipalities with Local Emergency Operations Plans, and we've secured funding to get FEMA-approved Local Hazard Mitigation Plans for any municipality requesting assistance. Both local plans will help municipalities meet state funding requirements and reduce local expenses in the next emergency.
- Parcel mapping: Large or small, more communities are discovering the importance of digital parcel (tax) maps for effective long-range planning. NVDA has now helped a dozen NEK communities access mapping funds and assistance.
- Foreign Trade Zone #286:

Lamoille County was added to NVDA's zone in FY2015, which can lead to more cross-border impacts from increased business activity.

• This year our staff of 10 directly assisted 41 towns and 100+ businesses, representing more than 8,000 hours of staff support. NVDA plays a significant role in shaping the beautiful region in which we live and work.
